1. disposition

3. predilection

"I desire therefore, in this narration, to state those facts which led to my <u>predilection</u> for that science" (33).

Based on the word ending and the use of the word in the sentence, what part of speech is the word?

4. charnel

"Now I was led to examine the cause and progress of this decay, and forced to spend days and nights in vaults and <u>charnel</u> houses" (48).

5. arduous

"The materials at present within my command hardly appeared adequate to so <u>arduous</u> an undertaking" (50).

"My <u>ardour</u> was indeed the astonishment of the students; and my proficiency, that of the masters" (47).

7. pedantry

"His instructions were given with an air of frankness and good nature, that banished every idea of <u>pedantry</u>" (46).

8. proficiency "My ardour was indeed the astonishment of the students; and my <u>proficiency</u>, that of the masters" (47).

9. amiable

"I who had ever been surrounded by <u>amiable</u> companions, continually engaged in endeavoring to bestow mutual pleasure, I was now alone" (41).

Based on the word ending (-able) and the use of the word in the sentence, what part of speech is the word?

Take note of the definition, discussed in class (and be able to come up with synonyms and antonyms on your own).

The etymology is *amare* "to love."

10. cursory

"But the <u>cursory</u> glance my father had taken of my volume by no means assured me that he was acquainted with the contents..." (34).

What ideas do you have about the meaning of "cursory" based on the rest of the sentence?

Based on the word ending (-ory) and the use of the word in the sentence, what part of speech is the word?

The etymology is *currere*="to run."
